Thank you for caring

My name is Hanan, I am 25 years old and I arrived in Australia after fleeing Syria less than two years ago with my older brother. In Syria, I lived in Damascus and was in my final year of studying a Bachelor of Translation degree. I love the English language. Sadly, I couldn't finish my degree as we had to leave.

Arriving in a new country is extremely challenging and a huge adjustment. To be honest, at the start I didn't feel good about it. My family and friends were back home. Everything was new and I didn't know anyone.

I knew what would make it better would be meeting people and learning about Australia, and that's why I joined the Brotherhood's Youth Transitions Support Pilot. The program helped a lot. It taught me how the education system worked, how to interview, how to write a CV ... These things might seem simple, but they are difficult for people who have language as a barrier.

The Brotherhood staff knew that I was interested in Community Services so they helped me with that. I am now studying a Certificate IV in Community Services. I am really interested in working with young people and migrants. I can relate to people who came here and how they feel. I might be able to give something back one day.

People like you make young people in my situation feel good and more welcome. You are helping us build our skills and we feel like we are part of a community that cares.

I really like the idea that the program works closely with the young people it supports. They give advice that is relevant and suitable. The Brotherhood is a very supportive organisation.

I have been part of the program for one year now and I love it. I know others do as well. We can express ourselves freely. We have a lot of fun.

Getting ready for the new school year

Over two massive days in November, 80 corporate volunteers from six organisations joined the Brotherhood of St Laurence to prepare 2,700 education packs for school children experiencing disadvantage.

Funded by the Ross Trust, the packs include pencils, a document wallet, scrapbook, exercise book, glue stick, ruler and markers to ensure every young child is ready for the 2020 school year. Once the hard work is done by our wonderful volunteers, the education packs are distributed to 27 community organisations in Victoria, as well as young people participating in the Brotherhood's community programs.

Over the past three years, 9,100 young people have benefited from the Brotherhood's education pack program, helping children to go to school ready to learn.

Corporate volunteering is a great way for organisations to give back to the community. In 2019, the Brotherhood has welcomed 190 volunteers from eight organisations at our social enterprise sorting facility, contributing 1,520 hours of assistance. Corporate volunteers also play a big part in the delivery of the Brotherhood's programs and services through various roles, including mentoring,

cooking breakfasts for children at Breakfast Club and running leadership development workshops. We'd like to extend a huge thank you to the Ross Trust for funding the program and to the wonderful corporate volunteers who prepare the packs each year.

You can support refugee families to settle & prosper

Settling in a new country with a young family can be extremely challenging for anyone. Now imagine moving countries under deeply traumatic circumstances, with little to no support. Then imagine trying to get yourselves set up and learn to navigate Australia's complex system of services for children. This is a situation that many families from refugee or asylum seeker backgrounds face alone every day.

The Refugee Child Outreach (RCO) is an early intervention program designed to support newly arrived families with young children of refugee or asylum seeker background with the tools and support they need to set their children up for learning in Australia.

Connecting families to local networks and resources

"I am so excited, I can get Arabic books, I can read and so can my children" — RCO assisted a mother and her three young children to catch the bus and access their local library.

The program seeks to improve the life chances of young children from migrant backgrounds by focusing on their developmental needs and connecting them to early years support.

It also provides direct assistance to parents by building their parental capacity and linking them to employment and education opportunities and social networks.

Assisting with community integration

A family arrived in Australia, and within a few weeks, the RCO had linked them to the school holiday program at the local recreation centre. The support worker also accessed funding for the children to attend the centre two days a week after school. They connected the mother with a mentor volunteer on those days so she could practise conversational English.

Pathways to employment opportunities

"I could not even work out how to use public transport." – A mother said she felt so stupid when she arrived in Australia. She was a lawyer and suddenly felt like she was nothing as she can't practise in Australia.

"I will be in work again." – With the support of the RCO, this mother is more confident and has commenced the process of finding work with the Brotherhood's Given the Chance team.



Thanks to generous support this year, the Refugee Child Outreach program has successfully:

- delivered weekly workshops to the Iranian Women's Group, which consisted of 12 women and 21 children (total 33 participants) to understand their early years' and family needs. The RCO support worker provided each family with an average of 12 hours support
- connected women and their children to many local support services, which included play sessions
- engaged and delivered intensive
 1:1 case support to 12 families
 (17 children) across Hume
- referred 24 families and 38 children to 80 local social and health service providers
- commenced planning for school holiday and Christmas break activity programs.

Energising Social Change

Schneider Electric is a global leader in providing energy and automation digital solutions for efficiency and sustainability.

Through a partnership developed in 2018, the Brotherhood of St Laurence and Schneider Electric have been working on specific projects together designed to address fuel poverty for those most in need, and assist the Brotherhood on our journey to become carbon neutral.

Schneider Electric's specialist Energy and Sustainability Services (ESS) team are currently undertaking a review of the Brotherhood's energy bills across our 68 sites. This is the first stage of a project to reduce the Brotherhood's energy consumption, energy bills and overall carbon output.

Another upcoming collaborative project will assist low-income renters to access more affordable, sustainable energy and reduce fuel poverty in Victoria. Tam Johnston, Schneider Electric Foundation and Community Lead, says the partnership with the Brotherhood aligns with many of the values of the company. "We have a shared commitment to the idea that people

should be able to access the energy they need to thrive. We believe that access to energy is a human right, and we support the Brotherhood because we believe in the program of work in energy equity."

The Brotherhood of St Laurence is proud to partner with Schneider Electric Foundation and is excited to continue to work together to energise social change for all Australians.

Moving together in Anti-Poverty Week

On Sunday 13 October, the Brotherhood of St Laurence's staff, supporters and friends proudly banded together to take part in the Melbourne Marathon. Melbourne turned on the sunshine as over 70 of us took part. For the first time this year, we also had a few members of staff who ran the full and half marathon — an incredible achievement!

The event marked the start of Anti-Poverty Week, an awareness-raising week in which Australians are encouraged to take part in activities that aim to reduce hardship and address inequality. The Brotherhood of St Laurence is a key supporter. This year our focus was on children living in poverty. The occasion provided an opportunity to raise money for our children's programs.

Katrina Herbert, head of the Brotherhood of St Laurence's children's programs, addressed the crowd at the Brotherhood's Melbourne Marathon tent explaining that, "too many children are starting school behind. Victorian statistics show one in five children are developmentally vulnerable when they start school. Your support today will contribute to our collective efforts to break the intergenerational cycle of disadvantage and give children the best start at life. Early intervention is critical to this."

We were delighted with the interest from Brotherhood staff, friends and family in taking part through fundraising, walking and running the Melbourne Marathon. In total, we raised \$29,287. That is double the amount raised from 2018. It expresses a wonderful and generous effort from our fundraisers and supporters. We hope to build on this effort still further in 2020.
