### THE SUPERIOR'S LETTER.

Brotherhood Headquarters. Fitzroy, N.6.

September, 1938.

Dear Friends.

You will be surprised at the advent of the Notes at this early date. You will be surprised, too, at their smallness. They come out now in order that you may know details of two important events in the near future. They are smaller than is the case as a rule because it is not so long since the last issue appeared. I would have our new friends know that it is our custom to give more details of our work than we are doing in this issue. It is our intention to bring out the next issue in December, instead of in January, as we do as a rule.

Before I write of coming events, I must try and express my thanks for the wonderful and cheering response made to my appeal for £500 in connection with our £4000 appeal for improvements to our Fitzroy property. As you will see elsewhere, I am already near my objective. Friends have not only been good in sending money, but I have received many most encouraging letters. I fear that I have only been able to answer these letters in a very few words, as my correspondence has been specially heavy of late. It is indeed good to know that you think that we are doing a work that is of real value. I feel that our organisation should be known as "B.S.L. and Friends," for there would be no B.S.L. were there no friends.

Those responsible for the shop which was opened for eight days in Gertrude Street. Fitzroy, are very grateful to all who sent in articles for sale. The venture brought in £60, which I think was remarkably good. The gratitude of the people who were able to buy warm and useful clothes at a very low price made the workers feel that their work was more than worthwhile. I used to feel a little guilty when I noticed the tired faces at the end of each day of those who carried on the shop. Theirs most certainly was a strenuous job. In

spite, though, of the strenuousness of the job, Miss Calvert and her associates have decided to carry on with the good work. They are taking over a shop next to our Headquarters, and which is owned by us. It is to be opened on Thursday, September 22nd, for two days, and will open for the same period each month. Once again the success of the venture will depend on our friends. I know that you will not forget us, and that you will let us have anything that you can spare for sale in the shop. We have hit upon a plan which is of great help to us financially, and which is of great help to the poor of the district. I think you will agree with me when I say that the shop is a far better idea than a bazaar or market fair. The shop committee have asked me to say that there was a great demand for children's clothes. It may be that some of our friends could make such articles.

The South Yarra Auxiliary are about to make their fourth big annual effort on our behalf. are organising the play "Libel!" in the Princess Theatre on Saturday, September 17th. It is being presented by Mr. Terence Crisp, and played by the Teachers' Training College Dramatic Club. kets, which may be reserved at Glen's, from September 12th, are to be 6/-, 4/-, and 2/-. who have attended the plays organised by the South Yarra Auxiliary in past years can be assured of as enjoyable an evening on September 17th as on previous occasions. Some of us deplore the fact that so few good plays are staged nowadays. We are assured that "Libel!" is a really good play, and well worth seeing—and in seeing it and in enjoying yourself you will be helping the B.S.L. ## THE NEED FOR A NEW ORDER.

Appeal by the Rev. G. Kennedy Tucker.

Members of the Sydney division of the Legion of Christian Youth were privileged on Monday evening, July 18, to sit for a while at the feet of Rev. G. Kennedy Tucker, Superior of the Brotherhood of St. Laurence, Melbourne, and to learn from him something of the work of human reclamation and rehabilitation on which the Brotherhood is engaged.

Working in Fitzroy in shocking slum surroundings, Father Tucker realised the futility of "ringing the church bells and asking people to come to church." After all, Jesus didn't begin by preaching. He fed the hungry, and when folk were sorrowful Hc cheered them: that is the centre of the Gospel message. And Father Tucker discovered that as soon as one begins to work and practise along our Lord's method then the necessary help is forthcoming.

The war produced some fearful tragedies, "but," said Father Tucker, "there are worse tragedies in these cities of ours than anything I saw during the war. When you have to live amongst these people and you see boys being absolutely ruined, you realise that here is casualty of the soul—casualty of the whole personality. We are killing the divine spark by allowing people to live in such vicious surroundings. It is our job to get that on the conscience of the community."

The pious platitudes with which we are met that slum-minded people cannot be changed, that they enjoy living amid sordid surroundings and so on ad infinitum, have been proved to be lies. Of course, we have to be patient with people who have enjoyed little of life's amenities, who have had few advantages; it is necessary to place an ideal before them and then build up that ideal.

There is so much to be done, the work is so tremendous that sometimes one wondered if it was all worth while, but the clarion call was for a new order, a certain number of people who will come away from the selfish competition of the ordinary

occupations of life, give up their ambitions for success in life, and put all their resources into this greatest of all work. The Church was not founded by people doing spare-time jobs. A certain number were called to give their all. It is not that the work of those who spend their leisure in service to their brethren is deprecated, but some are called to make greater sacrifices, to give up all chances of success as the world counts success. That is the way in which the Church was founded.

Speaking particularly to Legionaires, Father Tucker said that the Church is in the position she is to-day because she is not doing the work of her Lord. "In spite of discouragements," he said, "go on with that work which you know in your hearts to be right. Be patient. The world is terrified, looking for something which it can grasp. We have that something that the world wants. We can, and we must, go forward."—"Australian Christian World."
