Dear Friends. Economy must be the order of the day during this time of wai -hence the advent of the Notes in an attenuated form. We realise that many calls are being made, and many more will be made, on your financial resources, but I feel sure that you would not have us curtail our work in spite of the war, and all that it means to us. The support and the sympathy that you have given us for so long indicates to me that you realise that our work of the past has been of value. I think that our work is of even greater value during these days of war, and will be of still greater value in the days after the wa, when all our resources will be needed to help in ministering to a sick and disillusioned world. Wrong as I believe war to be, I feel that we we're loiced to go to war—we had to choose between the lesser of two evils. Although we will all have to make our contribution towards the successful prosecution of the war. I believe that more is required of us. I believe that we have to begin now to prepare for the reconstruction that will have to take place after the war. It would be foolish to prophesy as to the state of the world after the war, but it would seem that we will have expected to face a financial depression greater than we have ever known in the past. Such will involve suffering for all, and such, I fear, will endanger the well-being of many organisations that are working for the benefit of mankind. I believe that the time is coming when the organisations to which I have referred will be unable to carry on without

great sacrifice on the part of those responsible. If the work is to continue, many men, and many women, too, will have to work without financial reward.

Up to the present, we of the Brotherhood receive the sum of 15/- a week for personal expenses. I know that I am speaking for all the members when I say that, if the sum referred to has to be reduced, or even given up entirely, we will still carry on. I think that our friends will see that we have the wherewithal for food and shelter. In future, we shall only take men for training who are prepared

shall only take men for training who are prepared to make any sacrifice that the future may demand. Tens of thousands of men are ready to die in the service of their country. If any of our young men feel that it is their duty to take up arms, we will not prevent them from so doing, but if they stay with us they will have to be prepared to make sacrifices as great as those who go forth to war. As I said before, we have to carry on with the war, but we must be prepared for the days after the

war.

Such I feel to be my chief task as head of this Brotherhood. There is a handful of men with me whose aim is to serve their fellow man irrespective of the personal cost. I want to add to that number. I want to build into an army of men who are prepared to "endure hardness as good soldiers of Jesus Christ"—men ready to do anything, go anywhere, suffer anything for the hastening of the time that war shall be no more, and all mankind shall acknowledge Christ as King. We realise that the war and the days after the war are going to make great demands on us. May we be given grace to respond to those demands!

I have been told by some that we are going to be badly hit by the war, and that people will divert their contributions from us to war funds. My answer has always been that our friends will not fail us. It is a question once again of "this ye ought to have done and not to leave the other undone." To provide for the needs of the soldiers, and to meet heavy taxation, and at the same time to respond to the call of the half-starved and ill-clad youngsters in the slums, and of others who are suffering through no fault of their own, will involve sacrifice, but I cannot think that Aurtralians in general, and B.S.L. friends in particular, will shirk the sacrifice demanded.

I know that you will not forget our people at Christmas time. We want to give our settlers their usual Christmas presents, and to give the men and boys of the hostel a good Christmas dinner, and then there are the youngsters in the S. Mary's district. We want to bring some happiness into their drab lives.

For six years we have been doing what we could for those who have been thrown on the scrap heap of life. We feel that even the war must not prevent us carrying on with that work. It will not, I know, because you good folk are going to stand by us, come what may.

I think that the picture that goes to you with the Notes speaks more eloquently than can any words of mine.

I hope that what I have written will enable you to understand our war policy, and to see that what we stand for is of even greater importance in these days of war, than it was in the days of peace.

It may seem out of place to wish you all a Happy Christmas when there is so much to make us unhappy. I think, though, that we can be happy even in these dark days. We can be happy if we are doing our part to displace hatred, and suspicion by love and goodwill.

I therefore wish you all a very Happy Christmas, and in doing so I thank you for all you are doing for us and our people.

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MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE IN A FEW WORDS.

Staff Changes.—The Vice-Superior has been transferred to Headquarters, of which he will have oversight. He will also act as Priest in charge of S. Mary's) and be responsible for the Carrum Downs work. This arrangement will relieve the Superior of some of his responsibilities, and enable him to devote more time to the work of organising. The Superior will continue to be Vicar of S. Cuthbert's, and will also act as Warden of the Training Centre, which is referred to below.

Keble House.—Some of our friends will remember that the above was the name of our Training Centre when it was situated in East Melbourne. Circumstances were such that we had to transfer the work, as a temporary expediency, to Carum Downs. Through the generosity of a friend who is specially interested in our training work, Kehle House is again to come into being. It is now to be situated within a minute's walk of S. Guthbert's. Church, East Brunswick. Mr. Frank Coaldrake, B.A., who for the last three years has been traveling secretary for the Australian Student Christian Movement, has been annointed tutor of the House. Mr. Coaldrake is coming with the view of joining the Brotherhood.

In addition to our own students, the House will be able to accommodate a certain number of young men who, while working in the cit. desire to study, and test their vocation for the Sacred Ministry. Mr. Coaldrake will be able to guide such men in their studies. We have already secured a staff of lecturers, who will prepare full-time students for the Th.L. examination.

Our Shop.—Owing to ill health reasons, Mrs. H. Hobson Walker has had to resign her position as president. We much appreciate the efficient and ready service Mrs. Walker has rendered us. Mrs. Healy, of the S. Cuthbert's parish, has been appointed in Mrs. Walker's place.

The Committee also advised that it should be suggested to supporters that, for the time being, they make their contributions available for general maintenance rather than for extension work.


