# THE SUPERIOR'S LETTER

# IMPORTANT CHANGE

51 Royal Arcade, Melbourne, C.1.

October, 1946.

Dear B.S.L. Friends,

"For some years past the assets of the Brotherhood of S. Laurence have been invested in a holding body known as the S. Laurence Trust, the object of which was to ensure that monies held would only be used for the purpose for which they were originally given.

"In order to better cope with the ever-increasing social work of the Brotherhood, the Trust has now become not only a holding body, but a Board of Management. The Superior of the Brotherhood (Father G. K. Tucker) is Governing Director and the Rev. M. J. Clarke, Messrs. R. C. Backholer, F. C. Kimpton, S. Tuxen and A. L. Wettenhall are Directors.

"On the death or resignation of Father Tucker, the Board has the power to appoint one who, under the direction of the Board, would manage the social activities of the Brotherhood. The Board is to appoint one who would act as assistant to the Governing Director and who might ultimately become Manager.

"The Board has no jurisdiction in the inner working of the Brotherhood as such, nor has it any say in the appointment of future superiors. Such will continue to be the function of the Chapter."

The above quotation is from the "Church Standard." I regard the formation of a Board of Directors as a very important step in the history of the Brotherhood. It secures, I think, as far as is humanly possible, the continuity of the social work of the Brotherhood. That continuity depends no longer on one or two individuals. When those responsible for the formation of the Brotherhood and those who have given of their substance and service have passed hence, the S. Laurence Trust will continue to function. All the members of the Board as now constituted have been closely associated with the Brotherhood for many years past. The Rev. M. J. Clarke is one of the founders and was a member for ten years, He resigned to become a chaplain with the A.I.F. Mr. Backholer has been

the Brotherhood's honorary accountant for ten years. That we have been able to weather financial storms and are now in a haven of security is to a large extent due to his wise counsel and expert knowledge. Mr. Kimpton was the first to offer his services on the Brotherhood coming to Melbourne. He has been a member of the Advisory Council ever since. The same applies to Mr. Tuxen, who helped us much when the Hostels were functioning. His expert knowledge has been of the greatest assistance on all matters pertaining to Carrum Downs. Mr. Wettenhall has been the Brotherhood's honorary solicitor during all the years it has been functioning in Melbourne. I feel confident that the Brotherhood's social work could not be in more competent hands than in those of these gentlemen.

### ASSISTANT DIRECTOR

I hope that I may be allowed to continue to guide the destinies of the Brotherhood for a few years more, but one must prepare for the future, or, as the Prayer Book has it, put one's "house in order." The Board is anxious to appoint as soon as possible one who will come as Assistant Director of the Brotherhood's social activities. It may be that the one appointed may ultimately be responsible for all my present duties in connection with the social welfare side of our work.

## AN ENDOWMENT FUND?

May I tell you of one of my hopes for the Brotherhood within the next few years? It is for something in the nature of an endowment fund. One of our difficulties over the years has been that the head of the Brotherhood has not only had to act as a sort of general manager of all the activities, but he has had to secure the money for the carrying out of the same. Such not only involves a considerable strain on the person concerned, but it also tends to take from the general efficiency of the work. It is to avoid this difficulty in the future that I want the endowment fund. I should like the fund to be large enough to provide the salary of the Director of the social work of the Brotherhood. The first step has already been taken towards

the establishment of the Fund. The Board has decided to establish a Reserve Fund which, it is hoped, will ultimately become the Endowment Fund. Already about £600 is in that Fund. This has come almost entirely from the sale of the stamps and rent from Keble House, the money for the purchase of which property came partly from the Stamp Fund. I have just been informed that we are to receive the sum of £100 from the estate of the late Mrs. S. M. Victor. I am hopeful that we may be able to put this sum into the Reserve Fund. It is in such ways that the Fund will be built up and the future security of the Brotherhood will be assured.

### MARKET WEEK

I know you are all going to do what you can to make the Market Week (21st to 25th October) a success. The ladies who are to take charge of the stalls are going to do what they can to stock them, but I have said that the bulk of the goods will come from Brotherhood friends. You will not fail me, will you? I want it to be an "all-in" affair. I ask two things of Melbourne and nearby friends. First, that they will attend the Fair if it is at all posisble, and second, that you will bring or send something for sale at the Fair. Of country friends and those who, for various reasons, cannot attend the Fair, I ask that they should send something, even if only a pot of jam, to help stock the stalls.

I am very anxious that you should see the transformation that has taken place to Headquarters since the beginning of the year. I want you to see the Coolibah Club, and the garden, too. We were given a sum of money for the purpose of making a garden. It does much to counteract the effects of our none too pleasing surroundings. In my spare time I have been putting in seedlings. I hope they will be in full bloom when you come to the Market Fair.

I am not unmindful of the fact that we have been able to take the important step in the Brotherhood's history to which I referred earlier due largely to the sympathetic generosity of you, our friends. I think I can say that we are in a stronger position to-day than we have ever been before. For that I give thanks to Almighty God and to you who have given so liberally of your substance and service.


