THE SUPERIOR'S LETTER

IS THE END NEARER THAN WE DARED HOPE?

51 Royal Arcade,
Melbourne, C.I.
August, 1947.

Dear B.S.L. Friends,

In one of the sub titles in my last letter to you I quoted the words "How long, O Lord, how long?" It would seem that the answer is to be given, and that the end is nearer than I dared hope. The question, you will remember, was in regard to the subject of which I have been writing and speaking for the last 12 years — the question of slums. Our film "Beautiful Melbourne" has shocked all who have failure we shall carry on with the fight. I have always felt that I was right in urging that something should be done to alleviate the sufferings of slum dwellers, but I have some-

times thought that I was but a voice crying in the wilderness. The situation, however, has now changed. I feel now that people are beginning to really understand the situation, and that I am speaking for the vast majority of Australians. Such must be the case, for I am merely asking for "a fair deal," and we, with all our faults, do stand for justice. It is on that I take my stand.

JUSTICE FOR ALL, IRRESPECTIVE OF CREED, COLOUR OR CLASS.

You are with me in that, are you not? Since the showing of the film many have tried to side track the issue. I have been accused of "dangerous emotionalism," and it has been demonstrated that vested interests are one of the causes

for the delay in the providing of better living conditions for slum dwellers. No one, however, has yet answered the question I put to the Premier in the form of a request. This is what I asked the Premier:—

1. That a reasonable amount of labour, material and money available for building purposes be allotted to improve the living conditions of slum dwellers.

2. That all owners of houses condemned as unfit for human habitation should not be allowed to receive rents for same until the buildings are put into reasonable order.

The Premier's answer was that this is not the time for slum clearance. I had not, and I do not, suggest that it is. I am not unmindful of the general housing shortage, of the sufferings of your friends and mine because of such shortage. I am merely asking that people such as those amongst whom I live should have not an equal share (as perhaps they should) but a reasonable share. I am told that it is uneconomic to spend money on houses that will be pulled down in five or ten years' time. Such was said ten years ago, and many of those houses are still standing. I wonder if those who use the "economic argument" would use the same argument if houses in which their children were living were such that the life of their dear ones was in danger. They would do something about it even if the houses concerned were to come down in six months' time. I am shocked to think that the economic argument should be used when the question of life is involved. When I say, as I have said scores of times, that thousands of children in this City die every year because of the conditions under which they live I am stating a fact, and I defy anyone to contradict me, and yet I am told that "nothing can be done," that it is "uneconomic." It is not that those against whom I am arguing are callous as to the sufferings of others, it is, I must think, that they do not yet even understand the situation. It is for us to make them understand. I pin my faith on that Australian characteristic — a sense of fair play.

I must confess, however, that these people make me very impatient; and although, while not belittling their character or imputing wrong motives, I shall continue to attack them with every legitimate weapon in my armoury. In my last letter I told you of Mr. Lemmon's answer to Mrs. Blackburn in the House of Representatives in regard to Slum Clearance. Mr. Lemmon said that the slum clearance had been deferred. I have a very strong feeling that, and before very long, the people of Australia will demand a different answer from Mr. Lemmon — a modification of his answer at least. My last word (for the present at any rate!) on this question. New South Wales is doing something about the question of slums, why not Victoria? Both States, by the way, have Labour Governments.

THE MOST IMPORTANT PART OF THE LETTER.

Much of my time, alas, is taken up in material things, but in all my writing, speaking, and perhaps haranguing, I try to remember the power of things spiritual. The near approach of the Feast of our Patron Saint, S. Laurence, reminds me of that fact, and because we are so much involved in material things at this time, I want us all — the Brotherhood and the Brotherhood Friends, to make a special feature of the S. Laurence tide. I want you to do three things for us. One of these, all could do; two, many could do. They are:—

1. Say the S. Laurence prayer at least once during the S. Laurence octave, which begins on 10th August (S. Laurence Day). The value of this means more than perhaps you realise.

2. Attend the Service at S. Cuthbert's on 12th August.

3. Attend the Service at S. Laurence Church on 17th August.

Although all, of course, will be welcome at both Services, it may be that those who do not belong to the Church of England may feel disinclined to take part in the S. Cuthbert's Service, which will be the Holy Communion Service. Such, however, may not be the feeling of non-Church of England people in regard to the Service at S. Laurence's.

I think all (C. of E. or non-C. of E.) will be able to share with us in the joys of that Service. I hope I need not add that it is not my desire to entice anyone from the Church of their allegiance. In regard to S. Laurence's Church, it was from that Church that the Brotherhood, in a sense, derived its name. My late father was at one time Vicar of the Parish of which S. Laurence's Church is part. For me it has happy and sacred memories. I ask you to join with me in my pilgrimage back to that little Church, which has for nearly sixty years, under the patronage of the Saint common to us both, ministered to the folk of that corner of the Parish of South Yarra. The more strenuous the days are, the more we rely on your sympathy and your prayers. The present days are strenuous, indeed. It may be that the days ahead will be still more strenuous. I know we can continue to rely upon you, not only for your material aid, but for that which is still more important, your spiritual aid.

Our greetings to you all, dear people, and our thanks to you all — you really are good friends.

We have now an excellent kitchen at Headquarters. It is from here that a midday meal is served to the men of the Coolibah Club. The members of the Board and of the Finance Committee have their evening meal with us before their meetings. Mrs. Beverley, the manageress of the Club, kindly comes back as often as she can to prepare this meal, but we cannot ask her to do this indefinitely, and we would like to be able to ask other than those of the Board and Finance Committee to take their evening meal with us before meeting to discuss business and do such tasks as that of the "writers" referred to under "Thanks." Perhaps some good women might undertake to become B.S.L. cooks, even if only now and again. The meals we give are quite simple.

Positions Vacant ?

• This is not an advertisement, and the Board has not discussed the question of adding to the present staff. It is obvious, however, that if the work continues to grow as it does at present the services of more men and women must be secured. We only seek a certain type of person. With us there is no clocking in at 9 a.m. and clocking out at 5 p.m. The job must always come first. We could only offer low salaries, the work is hard, at times very hard; but for the right people it is intensely interesting and the difficulties more than worthwhile.

At our request, Mr. Petroff, shoe manufacturer, of Fitzroy; and Mr. Kenneth Wright, of Wright's Motors, have supplied the children of the Fitzroy School with milk for a month

each. Our aim was to do this for the three cold months. We have not yet been able to find another firm to do what those mentioned above have done. Knowing that our Friends would not want us to fail the youngsters, the Finance Committee have given their approval for the £15 necessary to be paid out of Brotherhood. Those who support us can think of 500 children having a glass of milk each morning at least.

Alcoholism.

With the co-operation of a number of doctors and members of the legal profession the Brotherhood is going into this matter. A very encouraging meeting was recently held at Headquarters. About this we hope to say more later. In the meantime we should be glad to give any information of what we are doing about "Alcoholics Anonymous." The movement is being sponsored for us by Mr. Wilding, and with encouraging results. Needless to say no promise can be made as to cure, but we do suggest that any suffering from this disease, or their friends, should procure a copy of our booklet "Do you know anyone living in a Lost Week-End?"
