THE SUPERIOR'S LETTER

**GENEROUS B.S.L. FRIENDS GIVE HAPPY CHRISTMAS TO MANY.
CAMPS FOR CITY CHILDREN — WHEN?**

Dear B.S.L. Friends,

You really were very good to us at Christmas time. Thanks to your generosity we were able to do more for our people during the Christmas just passed than ever before. As I write, the staff is busy arranging holiday outings and camps for about a thousand children. Some four hundred are to go, or already have gone, into camps for a week. The other six hundred have a day at the seaside or in the hills. This, of course, is good; but much more should be done. I am still hoping that what is done for country children in the way of holiday camps will be done for city children. We are told of the tremendous value of such camps. If they are necessary for the welfare of country children, how much more necessary are they for city children? Why is it that those children (and grown-ups, too), who need our attention most, are the ones who receive the least attention? We are indeed a strange people. If we are to survive as a Nation, we must increase our population; but yet we allow tens of thousands of potentially good Australians to either die or else to become burdens to themselves and to the State, a State which is in desperate need of what they might give it. Think of a sheep farmer who realises that if he is to continue to hold his property he must increase his stock. If, while buying stock from his neighbours, he allows the lambs he already had to die through want of care he would be called a fool, and such he would be; and he would richly deserve to lose his property. Is not that just what Australia is doing?

Without knowing to which Station I was connected I switched on the wireless on the afternoon of New Year's Day. What I heard encouraged me much. The speaker was the Rev. Dr. R. Wilson Macaulay speaking at Wesley Church P.S.A. He appealed for an Australian-wide Housing Campaign for 1950.

Such was the challenge made by one of the ablest and most far-seeing Divines of the Commonwealth. He is acknowledged to be such by Church and State. Are we wise enough to accept the challenge or are we going to continue to drift along, vaguely hoping that in some way the greatest of all our problems will solve itself. Of course, that of housing is not our only

problem, but none can be solved until we are a happy and united people, and this we can never be until all are adequately housed. Until the Government changes its present policy of allowing labour and materials to be expended on projects of secondary importance matters will continue to go from bad to worse. Although I have been accused by some members of the Government of being a carping critic, those same members refuse to answer my question in regard to projects of secondary importance. Until housing is made a matter of National importance I shall continue to maintain that the Government is failing in its duty of providing homes for the people.

WHAT CAN WE DO ABOUT THE MATTER?

There was a time when the B.S.L. was no more than a voice crying in the wilderness. That time has now passed. I consider that we are now Enemy No. 1 to those who would put other things before housing. That is good, but we still have a very long way to go yet. Above all, we need more friends. We have now 5,000. If we could double that number I believe the victory would be in sight. Now, this is what I ask for you. Will each one of you try and get another friend? We show, elsewhere, a picture of our new 5/- collecting card. Will each one of you send for two of those cards? One I want you to put in some conspicuous place in your home. In that way you will be able to collect 5/- from your friends; and I expect that at least one of those friends will be ready to take the other card you have. Please remember that the money derived would be by no means the most important part of the scheme. The securing of another Friend would be of still greater importance. If you do as I suggest, you will be doing three things:—

1. Accepting Dr. Macaulay's challenge in the most practical way.
2. Helping to double the fighting force of the B.S.L.
3. Helping the B.S.L. to respond to an ever increasing number of requests for help from those who for so long have been neglected.

As I write, I think of you good people in Melbourne and Suburbs — South Yarra, Essendon, Kew — and you in the country — Warrigul, Elmore, Warrnambool — and those in other States and Overseas. Dare I hope that before long one of these cards I speak of will be in, if not all your homes, at

any rate most of them. If you do as I suggest I venture to think that 1950 will be a year of real progress for the B.S.L. and all it stands for. I leave it to you, dear people, and in doing so I once again thank you for all the help and encouragement you give us, and, on behalf of the B.S.L., I wish that every happiness may be yours in the New Year and in all the years to come,

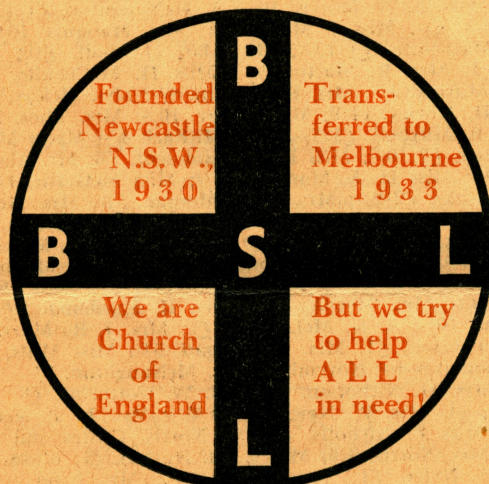
