

# The Superior writes on . . . "SETTING OUR HOUSE IN ORDER" COUNTRY TRIPS — FITZROY PLANS

Dear B. S. L. Friends,

Some little time ago a message came from one of the Melbourne Hospitals to the effect that a patient there wanted to see me with a view of drawing up his Will in favour of the Brotherhood. On arrival at his bedside I found him quite incoherent. He talked about his property, but I could make little sense what he was saying. I suppose I could have prepared a Will-form filling it in in such a way that after it had been signed and witnessed everything would have come to us. I could not feel however that I was justified in so doing. Had he no relations or others who should have benefited? I did nothing about it and soon after the man died.

I heard later that he was a man of considerable wealth and the authorities were trying to ascertain his next of kin. I understand that these were not found and that all he left went to the State. The moral of this incident is to emphasise the importance of doing what the Book of Common Prayer calls "setting our house in order," or in other words letting our wishes be known how our property should be disposed of after death.

WILLS

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The Brotherhood has been in existence long enough now to begin to benefit by those who remembered us in their Wills. In some cases complete strangers have left us substantial sums of money. To these we are very grateful and it is encouraging to know that even those who have had no personal contact with us consider that ours is a cause that they would wish to progress when they themselves are no longer here to witness that progress. Personally, I am always touched when I learn that some faithful B.S.L. Friend who gave us of their substance, service and sympathy have made provision in his or her Will

for the furtherance of our work

It is our custom to put a portion of such legacies into a "security fund"—something in the nature of an endowment fund. In this way departed Friends are still sharing in the work although no longer with us in the flesh. Our "Garden of Peace" at Carrum Downs is a memorial to those who have made provision for their giving to continue even after their passing. On All Souls' Day (November 2nd) each year we have a special service at Carrum Downs when B. S. L. Friends "ministering in the unseen world" are specially remembered. It is a service of special joy and inspiration.

In speaking on the subject of Wills may I suggest for those who might be contemplating remembering us, that they leave their money to the Brotherhood and not to any particular one of its activities, for it is difficult to anticipate our needs some years in advance. I would add however, that when the one drawing up the Will states that he or she is specially interested in one particular branch of the work, we endeavour to allocate the money in that direction.

### WESLEY BOYS WILL WORK AND STUDY

"Work and Study Weeks" are becoming a regular part of the educational programme of some University students and of Wesley College boys. In August, thirty senior boys from Wesley College will live at "Morven" and each day work in a different field of social service. In the evenings discussions on the problems they witnessed during the day will be led by a specialist in that field.

The work and study week held in June was attended by sixty University students who worked hard and usefully and agreed that they had learned a great deal about community problems that they might otherwise have always been ignorant of.

#### COUNTRY VISITS

Since Archdeacon Sambell has taken from me the main responsibility of the work of Carrum Downs I have been free to fulfil more country engagements than has been possible in the past. This is a work which I very much like and which is of great value. Since last writing I have had two very interesting country trips. On the first occasion I was able to preach on three occasions in the parish of Linton where the Rev. G. N. Hooper is vicar. From Linton I went on to Donald to fulfil a longstanding engagement. The Vicar, the Rev. R. G. White had arranged for me to address the Ladies' Guilds of the various Churches in the town. The by no means small church was full to capacity. There was another meeting in the evening and I showed our Carrum Downs slides. One, at least of the local Doctors is very anxious that a Settlement for elderly folk should be established in Donald. It is cheering to know that the Settlement idea is "catching on" in many parts of Australia.

My second journey was to the parish of Willaura; the Rev. Philip Burgess is Vicar. There I was able to preach on three occasions on the Sunday and to address a large gathering of women at Glenthompson on the Monday. On the

way back to Melbourne I stopped at Lismore and from there I went with the vicar the Rev. C. C. Cowling to Derrinallum where I showed the slides to a very enthusiastic gathering. I am very grateful to the clergy of the parishes I visited and may I say that I am more than grateful to the clergy wives who so kindly entertained me and Mr. Morris who accompanied me on my journeys. The chief object of my trips is not so much to raise money, but to create interest in our work. I might say, however, that I never return empty handed! I not only receive more than my travelling expenses, but the back of the car contains gifts of various kinds.

I am still hopeful that before the end of the year I may be able to tell you of definite plans for the carrying out of our Fitzroy building programme. An architect is at present engaged in preparing a master plan for our Fitzroy headquarters. Although the staff is coping manfully with the crowded conditions prevailing, the work is not being curtailed for lack of adequate space. No one is complaining, for the situation means that the work is growing, and that of course is as it should be. May the day never come when we are content with things as they are, for that would mean that we were standing still and that must never be.

With our Greetings and our thanks to all you good people who enable us to grow.

### A HOLIDAY CAMP FOR FAMILIES IS PLANNED

Mr. Hamilton-Smith, Group Worker on the Brotherhood staff is planning a holiday for 20 to 25 families during the January holidays. Proposed site for the camp is a Forestry Camp of huts and halls two miles from Kinglake.

For many years the Brotherhood has held camps for young people who would not otherwise have any holiday away from home. While it was known that parents needed a holiday too it was felt that the need was greater for the children.

The ideal situation is for a family to go away together but for many families with incomes of £13/10/0 to £15 a week and from three to nine children this

is quite out of the question.

The proposed Kinglake family camp will be an experiment in providing a holiday of good food, sunshine, fresh air and a lively programme of activities for families who would otherwise possibly never have the chance of holidaying together.

The Camp will be staffed by members of the Brotherhood staff and voluntary helpers.

### **FATHER TUCKER** ON TEN DAY TOUR

Father Tucker will visit Mt. Gambier, Port Fairy, Horsham, Charlton, Hopetoun, Bendigo, Birchup, and Swan Hill, in a ten-day tour of northern Victoria beginning on August 12th.

He will preach at a number of Churches and speak at public meetings on the housing of

elderly people.

Following a recent visit of Father Tucker's to Western Victoria the management committee of a home for elderly people has decided to revise their plans for a housing scheme and base it on the Brotherhood's Carrum Downs Settlement idea.
