CHRISTMAS


Dear B.S.L. Friends,

The gifts, the holidays, the toys, the Christmas dinners—the festivities associated with the worship and rejoicing of Christmas will be unknown to thousands of people unless the Brotherhood or some other welfare organisation can help provide them.

The number of people who turn to the Brotherhood for advice and help with personal, economic and family problems increases steadily each year and these are the people for whom the Brotherhood tries to provide something of the spirit of Christmas.

It is an opportunity for you and others to share your Christmas with those who are less fortunate by contributing to the Brotherhood's Christmas programme.



Christmas dinner is the highlight of the year at the Coolibah Club. This year the club will be packed to its limit capacity of 160 diners.

THE PEOPLE WHO NEED HELP AT CHRISTMAS

Mr. and Mrs. A. have nine children, the eldest 13 years of age. Mr. A. has been out of work for three months and the family has been existing on Unemployment Benefit of £4/15/- a week, and some aid from the Brotherhood. The children are undernourished, some badly so.

The Brotherhood hopes to be able to provide a food hamper for Christmas, some toys for the children and holidays for three of the older children.

Mrs. S. is a widow who lives with her two young sons in a small and grossly sub-standard room in a condemned slum home. The mother works in the afternoons and the boys roamed the streets until they joined the Brotherhood's Children's Club. We hope to be able to send the boys to one of the holiday camps at Mornington. It will be their only chance to get away from their unsuitable environment.

Mrs. W. has been in a Melbourne hospital for several months and her four children have been living in an institution. Mrs. W. will be well enough to leave hospital for a fortnight at Christmas. She is very anxious that she might spend the time with her children but has no home and nowhere to stay.

The Brotherhood hopes to arrange for Mrs. W. and her children to attend a holiday camp.


Mrs. T. is nearly 80. She lives in a small backroom for which she pays 30/- a week from her pension of £4/7/6. Like thousands of other pensioners, she is not able to provide any "extras" in the way of food or clothing to break the monotony of a frugal existence. Mrs. T. will receive a Christmas parcel from the Brotherhood and will share with 160 other elderly people Christmas Dinner at the Coolibah Club.

1,000 YOUNGSTERS ARE RELYING ON THE BROTHERHOOD FOR HOLIDAYS OR OUTINGS

From crowded and often substandard homes and from homes where it is financially impossible to provide holidays, children will go off to camps in the country and at the beach or participate in the day outings organised by the Brotherhood.

This year seven camps will be held for 350 children and day outings will be arranged for over 700 children. The cost of sponsoring a child for a holiday is £2. Will you help us provide this bright spot in the otherwise difficult lives of these children?

FAMILIES

Last year 596 old people received Christmas parcels through the Brotherhood. Over 400 of these parcels were packed and delivered by the Brotherhood's staff and voluntary helpers. The remainder were provided by donors.

Every effort is made to provide a parcel or hamper suited to the personal needs of the recipient.

Two hundred food hampers were provided for families on unemployment or sickness benefit or widows and deserted wives.

This year the list of pensioners and needy families is longer than last year, but every effort will be made to see that those in need receive some Christmas cheer.
