

The Rev. G. K. Tucker, and the Brotherhood of St. Laurence

Gerard Kennedy Tücker, born Melbourne, 1885, son of Canon Tucker, of Christ Church, South Yarra.

- educated at Melbourne Church of England Grammar School
- ordained in 1914
- served as private and Chaplain in A.I.F. 1915-1919
- Priest in charge and then Rector of Adamstown, Diocese of Newcastle, 1920-33.
- with Rev. G. Cox and Michael Clarke founded Brotherhood of St. Laurence at Adamstown in 1930
- B.S.L. transferred to Melbourne in 1933
- 1934 first hostel for unemployed men opened in Fitzroy
- 1935 settlement for unemployed families opened at Carrum Downs
- 1946 First housing elderly people at Carrum Downs
- Coolibah Club, the first elderly citizens' club opened in Fitzroy.
- Active in campaigns for slum clearance 1940-54
- Children's clinic and Youth Centre opened in 1952
- 1953 Food For Peace Campaign (new Community Aid Abroad) founded by Father Tucker

- 1956 Father Tucker honoured with O.B.E.
- 1958 Opening of new Social Service Centre in Fitzrey
- 1959 Opening of St. Laurence Park, Lara village for elderly
- 1961 Opening of Keble Court flats for elderly in Brunswick
- 1963 "Carinya" hospital for frail aged at Box Hill opened.
- 1964 "Forgotten People Appeal" to extend Brotherhood social services
